"Tassels twirled, candles flickered and multicolored silk ribbons swam through the air," wrote one reviewer. Another critic described a performance brimming with "colorful costumes, interesting props, cool lighting, riveting music and arresting images."

The Lily Cai Chinese Dance Company garners such reviews as it combines ancient Chinese forms with modern dance in an inventive marriage of styles in its performances.

Lily Cai, a native of Shanghai and former principal dancer with the Shanghai Opera House, founded the San Francisco-based company in 1988. She came to the states in 1983.

Her company tours nationally. Some notable performances over the years include opening a Grateful Dead concert in 1994 celebrating the Year of the Dog, and dancing at the United Nations' 50th-anniversary celebration in San Francisco in 1995.

Next month, Cai comes to Dallas. She'll conduct a two-week residency of workshops in dance at the University of Texas at Dallas. In addition, the company will present *Dynasties and Beyond* at 8 p.m. Feb. 7 at the Eisemann Center in Richardson

"We're delighted our dance students have this unique opportunity to work with Lily Cai. Her work is a fusion of her Chinese origins and western modern dance, spanning time from the age of dynasties to the 21st century," said Kathryn Evans, associate dean for the arts. UTD dance students will take the piece choreographed by Cai to the American College Dance Festival Association competition at Texas A&M University in March.

Cai's residency will end with a free lecture and dance demonstration at 8 p.m. Feb. 13 in the University Theatre. UTD is at 800 W. Campbell Road. Visit www.utdallas.edu.
